

GAB & GO STRATEGY

(aka Gallery Walks or Gallery Runs)

HOW TO USE

1. Prepare

Design six discussion prompts and post them around the room.

2. Set Up

Have students count off by six and assemble at a different station.

3. Discuss

At the first station, groups will read what is posted, and students record responses on a worksheet, notebook, whiteboard, or chart paper.

4. Rotate

On your signal, groups rotate clockwise to the next station. Repeat until all groups have visited each station.

5. Return and Reflect

Have students go back to their first station to read all that was added to their first response. Bring the class back together to discuss what was learned and make final conclusions about what they saw and discussed.

WHEN TO USE

Use Gab & Go Station at any point in a lesson to introduce a concept (e.g. identifying themes), to drive information to muscle memory (e.g. writing effective counterclaims), to build background knowledge (setting in California during Gold Rush), to discuss pivotal moments (e.g. characters' dilemmas).

Students face one another seated (as shown) or standing.


Step #5
