Owning It: How To Be Highly Effective & Love What You Do

Fifteen years ago, Alex Kajitani was a struggling teacher in one of San Diego's poorest neighborhoods. His students seemed unmotivated, unengaged and uninterested in what he was teaching. Demoralized and desperate, he set out on a journey to turn his class, and his life, around. Today, Alex holds the title of California Teacher of the Year and Top-4 Finalist for National Teacher of the Year, 2009, and is lauded for his innovation and "real talk" as a teacher.

From a frustrated new teacher to being honored at The White House Rose Garden, Alex now shares with educators across the country his journey to inspire them to new heights and fresh ways of thinking.



Leading for Teachers - Listening and dialogue: The keys to reflective inquiry for educators today Alexander Ballroom

Reflection is a hallmark of any worthwhile teaching endeavor. It is embedded in all professional standards and teacher evaluation instruments, yet schools do not provide adequate focus on the modes of inquiry to engage teachers in this practice. This session will highlight research and theories on democratic dialogue that foster meaningful teacher reflection.

Effective data leadership requires districts to systematically collect and warehouse data, interpret and analyze multiple-measures, and take strategic actions throughout the year. The Gradual Release of Responsibility (I do, we do, do collaboratively, you do) is a proven model for student learning, but is rarely used for teachers. Classroom Learning Labs bridge the gap between learning a new curriculum, strategy, or program through PD and perfecting it in the classroom. Connie will walk you through a collaborative learning process where teachers observe each other and provide feedback. Possible schedules, tools, and structures will be shared.

Leading for Student Outcomes - Creating a path towards higher level math for historically under served students in middle school-one district's story.
